

- Automatically install updates(recommended)
- Check for updates but let you choose to install them

Developers have added a special policy to Firefox that administrators can apply to stop Firefox from updating.

To disable Updates in Firefox 63 and above, do the following.

- 1. Close Firefox.
- 2. Open the Registry Editor app.
- 3. Go to the following Registry key.

HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\Software\Policies

See how to go to a Registry key with one click.

- 4. Create a new subkey here named *Mozilla*. You will get the path HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\Software\Policies\Mozilla.
- 5. Under the Mozilla key, create a new subkey *Firefox*. You will get the path HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\Software\Policies\Mozilla\Firefox.
- On the right, create a new 32-Bit DWORD value *DisableAppUpdate*.
 Note: Even if you are running 64-bit Windows you must still create a 32-bit DWORD value.
 Set its value to 1.



Disabling Firefox update based on IP is not feasible, as it is using DNS for IP lookup, whileas the Mozilla-leased servers may be changing all the time. You have to use host name based rules to block it. Assuming you have Raspberry-pi like front end as router and firewall, and assuming eth0 is for incoming Internet traffic, eth1 is for LAN outgoing, you may use something like following to effectively block all FF home-pinging traffic. Notification pop-up still exists, but these iptable rules protect you from forcing updates in the middle of uninterruptable work. If Mozilla starts using any new domain name later, people will easily detect it by tcpdump and add it into the iptables.

iptables -A FORWARD -i eth1 -p udp –dport 53 -m string –hex-string "mozilla|03|org" –algo bm -j DROP iptables -A FORWARD -i eth1 -p udp –dport 53 -m string –hex-string "firefox|03|com" –algo bm -j DROP iptables -A FORWARD -i eth1 -p udp –dport 53 -m string –hex-string "mozaws|03|net" –algo bm -j DROP

This may be extreme, but so is Mozilla's heavy-handed.

Download the standalone old version (e.g. < V:63) of Firefox from Intenert somewhere, fresh install it in your PC. Before launch it the first time, enable the above intable rules beforehand (IVERY IMPORTANTI). Otherwise Firefox will automatically undate its version in its first launch that gives the opportunity to call its home

Thank you for all the options – I added the policies.json in FF74 AFTER getting the "restart to update FF" message (I had blocked in UAC).

Worked perfectly (Win 8.1). Changed app.update.interval to 7776000 (90 days).

The notation in prefs "Your browser is being managed by your organization." is a link which opens the custom policy setting – very helpful they do get some things right!

When they fix the PDF/Moz pages markup issues I shall be happy with FF. (Don't shout at them about it just keep at them – I got blocked for that!) When someone makes an addon to change the nag to a toolbar icon which doesn't block the current page and get accidentally clicked, and can be pinned to overflow like the sync nag, everybody will be happier!
